### Dear Royal Oak Community:

On behalf of the Royal Oak Board of Directors and staff, we are pleased to present our annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021.

The Royal Oak Foundation continued its important work in support of the National Trust despite the challenges presented by the COVIC-19 pandemic. Most significantly, Royal Oak announced a major gift to the National Trust of \$4 Million in honor of the 125th anniversary of the Trust's founding. The gift is designated for the Decorative Arts Conservation Studio at Knole enabling the Trust to tackle several hundred significant and high-profile objects over the next 5 years, benefiting historic places across the organization. The funding from Royal Oak represents many years of generous donations from members and supporters, especially those who have made legacy donations. Royal Oak members and friends will have the opportunity to learn about the projects undertaken at the Studio through both in-person and online events.

In addition to this gift, Royal Oak completed its annual National Trust appeal for Fountains Abbey and Studley Royal Garden and provided just over \$250,000 to help mitigate the effects of flooding and provide a long-term conservation plan to save this World Heritage site for future generations. Our appeal for Dyrham Park began, with a goal of raising money to restore the Gilt Leather Parlor, an important room in the house with ties to the American Colonies in the days before independence. To support these efforts, we hosted two online fundraisers in conjunction with National Trust staff, a new format of collaboration for the Trust and Royal Oak.

Royal Oak continued to offer digital programs. This allowed us to reach audiences regardless of where they live, many of whom became new members. We introduced digital "walking" tours transforming Royal Oak members into armchair travelers visually exploring Britain. We plan to host some in-person events starting this fall. We are optimistic that travel will soon return to pre-pandemic levels. This autumn, we are hosting our annual Study Day in Britain with architectural historian John Martin Robinson. Royal Oak Heritage Circle members will visit Scotney Castle followed by a private lunch at Penshurst Place and tour of the gardens with the Head Gardner.

Our financial position remains strong. We want to thank our members for their continued support of the National Trust and The Royal Oak Foundation, and look forward to the time when can travel and meet in person.


Since travel to the UK was not possible, we endeavored to bring British culture to you in the

Heritage Circle tours were postponed this year due to COVID. But that did not deter members from upgrading to – or new friends joining – our premium

membership category. Despite suppressed travel to the UK, Heritage Circle revenue increased 19% over the last fiscal year. We are very grateful for the philanthropic leadership you continue to demonstrate.

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# **NATIONAL TRUST APPEAL**

### FOUNTAINS ABBEY & STUDLEY ROYAL WATER GARDEN



Our 2020 appeal for Fountains Abbey & Studley Royal Water Garden concluded in December 2020. We exceed our goal of \$250,000 to assist the National Trust in mitigating the devasting effects of flooding from the River Skell.

Situated on the banks of the River Skell, the Abbey and Water Garden are inextricably linked to the river. Due to changes in land use and climate change, the once 100-year flood now occurs on a regular basis causing irreparable damage to the site.

Working with local landowners outside of the National Trust site, the Trust aims to reintroduce natural catch basins and planted areas to absorb rainwater that would otherwise cause the river to flood. This will also reduce sediment runoff that clogs the waterways and beautiful reflecting ponds.

Some areas of the garden are owned by private landowners with whom the Trust will work to protect heritage and open them to visitors.

Surviving elements of the original garden will be recorded and conserved, such as the remains of

the cottage in Spa Gill Wood that was used by 19th century visitors when taking in the spa waters, as well as historic carriage drives, bridges and planting designs set out by William Aislabie in the 18th century.





# **ROYAL OAK CONSERVATION STUDIO**

### A MAJOR GIFT TO THE NATIONAL TRUST



The Royal Oak provides \$4 Million in funding to the Decorative Arts Conservation Studio at Knole

Royal Oak announced a major gift to the National Trust of \$4 Million in honor of the 125th anniversary of the Trust's founding. The gift will fund the Decorative Arts Conservation Studio at Knole for a period of five years. With these funds, the Trust will be able to conserve hundreds of important objects from many different Trust houses.

A gift of this scale represents a new era in our decadeslong partnership and marks this important anniversary year for the National Trust. In recognition of this transformative gift for collections conservation, the Trust has renamed the Studio, The Royal Oak Foundation Conservation Studio, for a period of 10 years.

As Europe's biggest conservation charity, the National Trust is home to one of the world's largest collections of art and material culture. With more than one

million objects at over 200 historic places, looking after the unique needs of such a deep and varied collection is one of the Trust's greatest challenges. These collections and interiors reflect an enormous range of materials and types of object – everything from paintings by the Old Masters to early Chinese teacups. Many of the works of art, furniture and other objects in the collections were commissioned, acquired and accumulated by past owners and their families over many centuries, as then-contemporary furnishings and dazzling displays.

With this support from Royal Oak, the Trust will be able to undertake much needed conservation work and technical research on key objects from around the organization. The Trust will prioritize objects which are classed as highly significant across a wide range of mediums including paintings, decorative arts, furniture and more.



# **PROGRAMS & LECTURES**

### **EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS JULY 2020-JUNE 2021**

From July 2020-June 2021, The Royal Oak Foundation continued its new program strategy presenting virtual events that combine live online lectures, as well a time-limited repay or "rental" of the recorded live lecture.

With COVID-19 curtailing travel plans—especially to the UK—the Programs department offered these online events as a U.S. member benefit, and to encourage Royal Oak membership and support for the National Trust from both non-members and interested Anglophiles. Digital events revitalized public involvement, and increased interest in the foundation from previously inaccessible audiences.

Our lectures and tours explored the latest scholarship on British history, art and design, and historic houses. Some highlights include a lecture on "The Wives Who Survived Henry VIII"; The Duchess of Rutland's talk about her home, Belvoir Castle and Gardens; a thrilling account of the Great Fire of London in 1666; bestselling author Ben Macintyre's true story of a soviet spy living in the English countryside; a tour of the newly redesigned British Galleries at the Metropolitan Museum of Art; and a look at the extraordinary Victorian paintings at the national museum in Puerto Rico among others.

From July-December 2020, Royal Oak held 26 events with 8,381 digital attendees. Nineteen of these were digital lectures with 7,662 attendees. The other seven programs, with 719 attendees, featured digital "walking" tours of NYC and Hudson NY, as well as online tours of museum exhibitions and galleries.

We introduced digital "walking" tours transforming Royal Oak members into armchair travelers visually exploring London, including a sold-out program that examined London's private Gentleman's clubs.

To thank Royal Oak members for their loyalty and support, we presented a free, members-only Zoom performance of English music by the London Philharmonic Orchestra, as well as a free-to-members only talk with noted British artist Ed Kluz. Royal Oak also arranged a special event for members with Giles English, co-founder of Bremont Watch Company, a British bespoke watch and chronometer business in operation in Henley-on-Thames, England.

Our 2021 Spring lecture season featured a collaboration with Sotheby's Auction House for a free digital lecture about the estate of the late Countess

of Mountbatten. This event surpassed all previous attendance to a Royal Oak lecture with 1,200 online attendees—a third of whom were non-members and new to the Foundation.

From January-June 2021, Royal Oak presented 26 online events—18 digital lectures and 8 digital tours of NYC, Chicago, London—watched by 8,304 attendees from 48 U.S. states and four countries. More digital walking tours showed the beauty of the Lincolnshire area, and its towns and churches, while another walk explored the Bankside area of London during the time of Shakespeare.

Royal Oak's Heritage Circle Members enjoy special benefits in the US including complimentary access to all 2020-2021 digital lectures and their recordings. Additionally, they received invitations to exclusive online after-lecture events for lively and jovial discussions with fellow members and our noted speakers.

Public feedback about our digital programming continues to be overwhelmingly positive and the Foundation is determined to keep scheduling digital events into the future.

In Fall 2021 and Spring 2022, we plan to offer a large number of digital lectures, even as we return to inperson programming and events across the U.S.



### **DIRECTOR OF MEMBER SERVICES, WINIFRED E. CYRUS, RETIRES**

It is with mixed emotions that we announce the retirement of our longtime employee Winifred E. Cyrus, Director of Member Services, effective July 31, 2020. Although we all wish her the best as she begins a new life chapter, we will, nonetheless, miss her terribly. I know many of you have a long association with Winnie from your equally long membership in the Royal Oak Foundation.

Winnie first came to Royal Oak in July 1986 and has had 34 continuous years with us. When she joined, the organization was working out of a cramped space on the third floor of a narrow brownstone on East 72nd Street. There were 2 full-time and 2 part-time employees. Royal Oak had just purchased its first computer (a mini-mainframe) and Winnie was instrumental in adapting its function to the needs of Royal Oak.

Since then there have been 4 office relocations and the Foundation has grown to a staff of 9 with thousands of members across all 50 states.

Winnie handled member services and was responsible for the daily operations of the New York office. She was an essential liaison to the National Trust. She coordinated Royal Oak's mailings and oversaw the shipping and arrival of all materials from the U.K., most especially National Trust handbooks and magazines. You may thank Winnie for ensuring that your member mailing arrived in your mailbox. To say she had close relationships on both sides of "the pond" would be an understatement.

The Foundation's institutional knowledge and the working history of both Royal Oak and the National Trust resides with Winnie, who is the longest





Though we must say farewell, it is not a goodbye as Winnie will always be a part of Royal Oak and the National Trust.







### **EXPENSES**
